

# AT THE CAPITAL

What are we keeping an eye on? From the minutes of the latest Food Producer's meeting. These Bills are supported by the Food Producers of Idaho and are of interest to our Grangers.

H592: This legislation would establish a fund for conflict prevention and livestock depredation by grizzly bears and wolves. This fund will provide compensation to livestock owners and producers that have experienced livestock loss. The Idaho State Department of Agriculture, in consultation with the Department of Fish and Game and the Office of Species Conservation, will manage the fund and will be the authorized agency for compensation to livestock owners and producers. The annual appropriation will be \$225,000, containing \$150,000 dedicated to livestock depredation and \$75,000 dedicated to conflict prevention. - This Bill passed through the House and on to Senate Resources & Environment

H612: This legislation that would allow the Wolf Depredation Control Board to determine and pay for livestock compensation. -This bill has passed through the House and on to Senate Resources and Environment Committee. (More on Idaho Legislature later!)

Teaming Together the Family Activities Director, Community Service Director, and Lecturer have put together projects that intertwine with the Grace's Diaper drive project. You can see the team has put their new projects into the new Programs book that will be sent to Granges by email and hard copies along with 2023 Journal of Proceedings.

Community and Pomona Granges have you updated your Grange's bylaws? I encourage all Granges that haven't updated bylaws in the last two to three years should do so this year. In the Quarterly Secretaries mailing a template will be sent for a guideline. Also copies of your deed and by-laws are needed for your files at the Idaho State Grange Office.

It is once again time to be writing resolutions, the ISG Board has a new Policy in place for 2024. Resolutions submitted will go to the Idaho State Grange Executive Board to be reviewed for current policy or law and editing suggestions attached to the original resolution and returned to the Grange that originally submitted the resolution. The Executive Board retains the right to reject any resolution. Due Date for Resolutions: September 1, 2024 (2023)

You may not like it, but scrubbing and mopping can keep you fit. You're in no mood to exercise, despite what you know you should be doing. The centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that adults get at least 30 minutes of moderate intensity physical activity nearly every day. there is good news. What you're already doing counts. "Moderate" housework is an acceptable form of exercise. This includes inside activities such as scrubbing floors, washing windows and moving light furniture. Outside work such as washing your car, mowing the lawn and gardening are also good. SO, this form of exercise is available year round, not just for spring.

### LEMON CURD COOKIES

**Lemon Curd Ingredients** 

½ cup cane sugar

1 lemon zest

1/4 cup lemon juice (used the juice from zested lemon)

3 egg yolks

1 teaspoon salt

½ stick butter

#### Lemon Cookie Ingredients

1 cup cane sugar

2 lemons zest

1 stick butter

2 whole eggs

4 tablespoon lemon juice (Also zested lemon)

1 teaspoon salt

1 -2 tablespoons vanilla

2 cups all-purpose flour

1 tablespoon baking powder powdered sugar

In a large stove pot, combine the lemon curd ingredients, except for the butter, on medium to low. Stir occasionally. Once ingredients are well combined and caramelized a bit, then add in your ½ stick of butter. Turn to low heat and stir occasionally while you make your cookie dough.

Grab your Stand Mixer and add all ingredients to make your dough. Mix on medium-low speed until well combined and you have a homogenous looking dough. Cover the dough and place in fridge for 1 hour.

While your dough is in the fridge, grab your strainer and place over small mixing bowl. Pour the curd mixture into the strainer and press down with a spatula to filter any chunky lemon pulp. Then cover your small bowl and place lemon curd in the fridge until needed.

Grab your baking sheet and cover with parchment paper. Pre-heat your oven to 350°F.

After cookie dough is cooled, remove from fridge and add powdered sugar to small mixing bowl. Roll your cookie dough into balls (approximately a size that would fit in your palm). Then roll each ball around in the powdered sugar until surface is covered. Place cookie dough balls on parchment paper. Use a small scoop or spoon to make a crater in the center of the cookie.

Remove the lemon curd from the fridge and using a spoon, scoop out a little bit of the curd to place in each cookie's crater.

Once all cookies are filled, place cookies in the oven at 350 °F for 10-12 minutes. Then remove and let cool!

In Memoriam of those Grangers that have passed on to the great Grange beyond.




#### **Dorothy Clark**

#### FROM THE FIRST DEGREE



M.: I will now call your attention to the implements of this degree—the Ax, the Plow, the Harrow and the Spade.

The **Harrow** is used to pulverize the soil as well as to cover the seed. Let this be emblematic of that course of study and observation necessary to enable you fully to understand your business.


#### Idaho Agricultural Protection Area Act H608

APA's provide landowners with an additional option when considering protecting agricultural land in the state. The legislation adds a new chapter to the Idaho Local Land Use Planning Act that would provide the legislative authority for county governments to receive applications from willing landowners to establish a land use designation, known as an Agricultural Protection Area. This Legislation was sponsored by the Idaho Farm Bureau. Idaho Food Producers and Idaho Dairyman's Association both voted to support this legislation at their February meetings.

From the Capital Review: "A hearing was held on H608 this past week and the only entity that was not happy with the legislation were the highway districts. However, the legislation passed out of the committee and is headed for the House floor. The legislation is sponsored by Representative Kevin Andrus."

# SOMETHING WE ARE NOT SO EXCITED ABOUT ACP Windown

Without additional funding from Congress, the allotted \$14.2 billion to fund the ACP is projected to run out in April 2024. (This date is an estimate and may change.) As a result, the FCC has begun taking steps to wind down the ACP, which means:

- ACP applications and enrollments are no longer being processed as of February 8, 2024.
- Households who have applied, been approved, and are receiving the monthly internet discount before February 8, 2024 will continue to receive their ACP benefit until ACP funds run out, as long as the household remains enrolled in the program.
- After the ACP funds run out (projected in April 2024), households participating in the ACP will no longer receive the ACP discounts.
