~Amanda Gorman #CULTIVATINGCONNECTIONS After a 25-year hiatus, Mountain Home Grange No. 285 near Potlatch has been resurrected to continue the long grassroots tradition of supporting agriculture and serving the community.

The Mountain Home Grange was founded in 1919 with 45 original members. Although the Mountain Home Grange was an active community center during its heyday, by the 1980s, it suffered much the same fate as many other Granges. Even though the formal Grange disbanded, the building, located about 5 miles north of Potlatch, continued in occasional use for various activities. Recently when the Latah County commissioners decided to revoke the Grange's tax-exempt property tax status as a fraternal organization several people decided to take another look at the situation. "We were trying to figure out how to keep the building a community building, and so I got in contact with the State Grange," Largent said. "We got together and decided to make it a community building, which was what we all wanted, and to reorganize the Grange." The initial turnout in April was encouraging. Largent said the group is hoping to find other ways to attract newer and younger members. "I think that we're going to probably try to get the building fixed up a little bit. It needs a lot of work," Largent said. "It will be a learning experience for everybody, I think." On April 17, 2021, Idaho State President, Eileen Javaux, National Membership Director Amanda Brozana, and ISG officers gave the obligation to the new members and installed the Adapted from Daily News Article by Kathy Hedberg, 5/15/21 officers.



#### **FAMILY HEALTH & DEAF AWARENESS**

**FAMILY HEALTH:** Here are a few healthy tips: Aim for 30 minutes of exercise daily, begin with small starts like these and build up from there: park your car at the far end of a parking lot, so you have farther to walk to a building's entrance; choose the stairs, rather than the elevator; wake up a bit earlier and exercise before you do anything else; snack on nuts – they supply health unsaturated fats, and munch on raisins for a healthy snack- they are one of the best snacks to control your blood pressure.

Protect your skin in the sun. Cover up. Wear a shirt with long sleeves and a hat with a wide brim. Seek shade, especially in the middle of the day when the sun's rays are strongest. Use sunscreen and wear sunglasses.

**DEAF AWARENESS:** Protect your hearing this summer. Here are some precautions to remember: Alternate noisy activities with periods of quiet - pump down the volume; use earplugs or other hearing protectors at work and home; limit lengthy periods of loud noise exposure – don't be fooled by thinking your ears are "tough" or that you have the ability to "tune out" noise. If you think you've "gotten used to" noise you're routinely exposed to, then most likely you've already suffered damage and acquired a permanent hearing loss. Have routine hearing checks with your doctor to monitor your hearing.

#### From the Court of Flora, Ceres and Pomona

Hello and Happy Summer,

I remember picking Gooseberries with my Grandma Freda Javaux and Aunt Jane Javaux, at Uncle Ed and Lucy's. These little berries were sour and then once Grandma made a pie they were sweet and a little tart. A bit of homemade ice cream makes the pie even better.

The gooseberry is a deciduous shrub that belongs to the currant family. This berry has 5 different tastes, sweet, sour, bitter, astringent, and pungent. There are many impressive health benefits to these tart berries:

- Gooseberries are low in calories (100 Grams is 44 Calories) yet packed with nutrients.
- Gooseberries are high in fiber, rich in antioxidants, and may help control blood sugar.
- They are a good source of vitamin C and vitamin B and minerals such as copper, calcium, phosphorus, and manganese.
- Gooseberries contain compounds that might prevent the development of cancer, neurological disorders, and inflammation.

## Spiced Gooseberry Oat Bars

#### **Ingredients:**

1 ¾ old fashioned rolled oats

1 ½ cups flour (I used Bob's Red Mill Gluten-free All-Purpose Baking Flour in this batch)

34 cup mascavo (muscovado) sugar (or brown sugar)

½ cup chopped walnuts

½ tsp baking soda

1 tsp salt

¼ tsp ground ginger

½ tsp ground nutmeg

1 tsp ground cinnamon

34 cup melted virgin coconut oil

2 cups thawed gooseberries

¾ cup raw sugar

1 tbsp cornstarch or arrowroot

2 tbsp water

1 tbsp lemon juice

#### **Instructions:**

- Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F. Grease a 9 x 13-inch baking dish with coconut oil.
- In a medium bowl combine the oats, flour, mascavo sugar, walnuts, baking soda, and salt. Add the ginger, nutmeg, and cinnamon. Pour in the melted coconut oil and stir to mix well. You should have a crumbly mixture that is wet enough to hold when pressed together. Reserve about ¾ cup of the mixture.
- Press the remaining oat mixture into the baking dish.
   Spread it evenly and press it firmly into the pan. Bake for 10 minutes. Remove from the oven and set aside.
- In a saucepan combine the gooseberries, and raw sugar (you can add more or less sugar to your taste).
   Bring to a boil, then simmer, for about 2 minutes. Stir to break up the berries.
- In a small dish, stir together the cornstarch, water, and lemon juice to make a paste. Add the paste to the gooseberries and stir until the fruit is thickened.
   Remove from heat.
- Spread the fruit over the oat crust leaving just about a ¼ inch edge on all sides. Crumble the reserved topping evenly over the fruit. Bake for 18 to 20 minutes or until the edges of the crust begin to brown. Cool the pan on a wire rack. Once cooled completely, cut into bars. Makes about 15 bars. In 1846, Nancy Maria Donaldson Johnson patented a design for a hand-operated ice cream maker which made it possible for the lower classes to create ice cream for all. According to Chris Clarke's book, "The Science of Ice Cream," Johnson's ice cream maker comprised of two spatulas that fitted tightly into a long cylindrical barrel. The spatulas contained holes and were attached to a shaft rotated by a crank. The outside of the cylinder was cooled with a mixture of salt and ice. Johnson's invention is still used to this day from modern ice cream machines found at home to the ones found in factories manufacturing this sweet dessert.

#### Herbs that Pair Perfectly As Growing Partners

- Chives A great all-around for most herbs and vegetables.
  - Plant them around rose bushes to ward off Japanese Beetles, reduce black spot and enhance the growth of roses
  - Chives repel aphids! Plant them next to peas, lettuce, and celery.
  - Chives also boost the yields of many fruits and vegetables as they encourage pollinators.
- Rosemary One of the few herbs that don't get along well with other herbs.
  - One herb that makes a good garden buddy is sage.
  - Rosemary does ward off the insects that attack broccoli heads.
  - It also enjoys the company of beans, cabbage, and hot peppers.
  - Keep your rosemary away from carrots, potatoes, and pumpkins.

HISTORY OF THE MT. HOME GRANGE #285 P OF H

On April 25, 1931, Mt. Home Grange was organized in the old Union Church. Membership dues for men were \$1.50 and for women, \$1.00, children 14-18 were 50 cents.

In 1932 a group of men started cutting logs which they hauled to Strong's mill to be sawed into lumber to build a hall. By June of 1933, the lumber had been sawed, staked, and covered, waiting to be planed. In 1934 the site for the hall was donated by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hanna. In June of 1935 construction on the hall began.

A loan was taken out at 6% interest, and the note signed by ten members. Card Parties and Pie socials were held to pay off the note and secure funds to continue construction. In January of 1936, the first meeting was held in the new hall. The polling location was moved from the Burden School to the Hall. A basketball team was organized and the hall was used. Members and nonmembers found themselves welcome.

An anteroom was added in 1937 and electricity installed later in the year. A stove was purchased along with Grange regalia. In January of 1939, Lewis Orsie Jewelers presented the Grange with a clock, with the promise of a larger when the membership reached 100. (Did this happen? Let us know!)

In 1941 came the war which delayed interior finishing and decorating. The inside is not so pleasing to the eye but the Grange had invested in war bonds. In 1942, it was decided that members going into the service would not have to pay dues while deployed.

## Chewy Chocolate Chip Cookies FROM THE KITCHEN OF LIDA LITTLE

Everyone who has tried these cookies says they're the best they've ever eaten. I'm sure the addition of pudding mix makes all the difference.

1 cup butter, softened

3/4 cup packed brown sugar

1/4 cup sugar

- 1 package (3.4 ounces) instant vanilla pudding mix
- 2 large eggs
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 2-1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 cups semisweet chocolate chips
- 1 cup finely chopped walnuts

In a large bowl, cream butter and sugar, until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat in pudding mix and vanilla. Combine flour and baking soda; gradually add to the creamed mixture and mix well. Stir in chocolate chips and walnuts (dough will be stiff).

• Drop by rounded teaspoonfuls 2 in. apart onto ungreased baking sheets. Bake at 350° for 8-10 minutes or until lightly browned. Remove to wire racks to cool.


But the official copy wasn't signed by all 56 signers until August 2, 1776.



#### Block Construction

Fabric Needed: 5-2 1/2 WOF.

2-White- 3 Colors of your choice.

Cut 12- 2 1/2 Squares- White.


Cut 4-2 1/2 Squares - Blue or Red

Cut 4-4 1/2 x 2 1/2 Oblong Strips - White

Cut 4 – 4 ½ x 2 ½ Oblong Strips – Blue or Red

Cut 4 - 61/2 x 2 1/2 Oblong Strips - Blue or Red

Sew a 2½" white <u>square to</u> a 2½" blue or red square. Add a 2½" x 4½" white rectangle. as shown.




Fold (2) 2½" white squares from corner to corner once on the diagonal and press the crease in place Using the crease as your sewing line, stitch a square to each of the red or blue, rectangles of the unit as shown.


Trim the <u>excess fabric</u> ¼" away from the seam, line. **Make 4** units for each block.


Sew 2 units together to form a row. Make 2 rows. Press the seams in opposite directions. Nest the seams and sew the rows together to complete the block.


Block Size: 12 1/2" unfinished, 12" finished.
